PreReading Bias Activity & Discussion	Literacy.RL.1 Literacy.SL.1	Students are challenged with nine controversial statements that are created to divide the students into two sides. We like to go question by question and have students physically separate to different sides of the classroom. "If you agree, come to this sideIf you disagree, come to this side. Try not to be a maybe or I don't know." Then we have students on both sides express their opinions, while the teacher offers challenging-yet-respectful questions back to each speaker. As students move through the statements, they'll be activating prior knowledge about the deeper issues in the story, while practicing their polite argument skills and getting emotionally connected to the story's ideas.
K.W.L. Activity	Literacy.RL.9	 This tool will help students prepare for reading the story and debrief and process what they've learned at the end. K = What you KNOW = students write down what they already know about a topic W = What you WANT to know = students write down what they would like to know about the topic L = What you LEARNED = toward the end of the unit, students write down what they learned about the topic
Plot Organizer	Literacy.RL.2	While reading the novel, students will analyze the 6 parts of the plot and find scenes/events that fit into each of the parts. The graphic-rich organizer will visually remind of the tension map of the story as they read.

Characters Organizer	Literacy.RL.3	Students will follow the various characters through the story and analyze various details/quotes/situations about them. They will consider physical descriptions, inner desires, and important traits about those characters in order to determine uniqueness and importance to the story.
Great Depression Crash Course Video	Literacy.RL.7 Literacy.RL.10	This video by John Green will energize and inform the students about what was happening in the rest of the U.S. society and the world during the time period of the novel. Learn about the causes and effects of the Great Depression.
Brown vs. Board of Ed. Video	Literacy.RL.7 Literacy.RL.10	Students will learn about the Brown vs. Board of Education court case and what that meant for America's school system. This will giv a solid context for the schools in their world.

These assessments require the students to understand the context of the word in a sentence from the novel. 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Pedagogy Activity **CC Standard** These writing prompts require students to write their unedited off-the-cuff responses to various quotes, situations, issues that arise from within the story. The questions take the students into Literacy.RL.1 Quickwrite memories from their lives (activating prior knowledge), Literacy.RL.2 connections with the story's characters and history (encouraging Writing Literacy.W.1 empathetic reading and understanding), and deep areas of **Prompts** thematic meaning (spurring informal argumentation). These discussions might prove to be some of the most meaningful explorations your students experience. These guizzes are crafted to assess whether or not students the chapters. If the students read the chapters, they should earn Comprehension 100%s...if they didn't read, they should not be able to guess their Literacy.RL.10 **Pop Quizzes** way to success. These can also be used as exit cards or quick comprehension assessments to see if the teacher needs to further explain the main events of the chapters. Then they will analyze what deeper meaning the symbol means in the novel. Students will choose from a few deep topics to either write an essay Literacv.W.1 Literacy.W.9 or turn their essay outline into a speech on the topic. During the Essay / Speech Literacy.SL.1 speeches, students will need to understand and chart the speakers' Literacy.SL.4 thesis statements.
