



Google Earth Activity	Literacy.RL.9	Using free software available through Google.com, the class will enjoy a multimedia tour through the locations in the story. Many of them will be zoomed in to 3D, ground-level views. All of them will give the students a close-up view of the world's geography and how the locations can come to life as they see the world there in class.
		Choose from a few options: (1) show them the tour of the world beforehand (withholding plot information to avoid spoilers) so they can see where you're going., (2) show them as the story unfolds, or (3) show them after the story is over as an eye-opening review.

PreReading Bias Activity & Discussion	Literacy.RL.1 Literacy.SL.1	Students are challenged with nine controversial statements that are created to divide the students into two sides. We like to go question by question and have students physically separate to different sides of the classroom. "If you agree, come to this sideIf you disagree, come to this side. Try not to be a maybe or I don't know." Then we have students on both sides express their opinions, while the teacher offers challenging-yet-respectful questions back to each speaker. As students move through the statements, they'll be activating prior knowledge about the deeper issues in the story, while practicing their polite argument skills and getting emotionally connected to the story's ideas.
Propaganda Cartoons & Video Response Activity	Literacy.RL.9	Students will look at the various Nazi propaganda cartoons as a class and discuss what they were trying to get Germans to believe about Jews. Show a video (a link is provided) of an Adolf Hitler propaganda speech. Then watch one or both of the End Slavery Now propaganda videos and answer the three response questions. This should spark a lively debate about the emotions propaganda sparks in humans and allow the class to discuss whether propaganda is good or bad and how we should recognize it.
Characters Organizer	Literacy.RL.3	Students will follow the various characters through the story and analyze various details/quotes/situations about them. They will consider physical descriptions, inner desires, and important traits about those characters in order to determine uniqueness and importance to the story.
Plot Organizer	Literacy.RL.2	While reading the novel, students will analyze the 6 parts of the plot and find scenes/events that fit into each of the parts. The graphic-rich organizer will visually remind of the tension map of the story as they read.
Conflict Organizer	Literacy.RL.2	While reading the novel, students will analyze the 6 kinds conflict and find scenes/events that illustrate the various kinds of conflict.

Quickwrite Writing Prompts	Literacy.RL.1 Literacy.RL.2 Literacy.W.1	These writing prompts require students to write their unedited off-the-cuff responses to various quotes, situations, issues that arise from within the story. The questions take the students into memories from their lives (activating prior knowledge), connections with the story's characters and history (encouraging empathetic reading and understanding), and deep areas of thematic meaning (spurring informal argumentation). These discussions might prove to be some of the most meaningful explorations your students experience.
Extra Credit Jewish Star Activity	Literacy.RL.9	This Diary of Anne Frank extra credit activity is not for the light of heart. Many students will not have the guts to follow through. For one week, students will wear the Star of David on the outside of their clothing at school. Everywhere they go. INCLUDED: * 1-page assignment handout * 1-page parent letter home First, this Diary of Anne Frank activity is completely optional and should probably be presented to and approved by your principal. Second, this Diary of Anne Frank activity is meant to be carried out with the highest respect and remembrance for what the Jews experienced during WWII. Third, the Diary of Anne Frank activity is meant to help give students a minor glimpse into what the Jews might have experienced during WWII. Hitler forced the Jews to wear the yellow Star of David on their clothes or armbands with the Star on their forearms or biceps. In respectful remembrance, the students may spend a whole week wearing the Star at school and, afterward, writing a page in response, discussing and exploring their feelings during the experience and trying to imagine what it might have been like for the Jews. Of course, there is no way our simple activity can compare to the gravity of the Jewish experience, but my hope is that my students might get a small glimpse into their world and hopefully come out the other end of the activity with a deep respect and sympathy for what the prejudice inherent in WWII might have been like. I cannot express how powerful this experience has been for my students while reading The Diary of Anne Frank. The ones who participate barely care about the extra points they earn. They are changed people.

Sentence Combining	Literacy.L.1 Literacy.L.1a Literacy.L.2a Literacy.L.3 Literacy.RL.9	This sentence combining activity uses sentences from the story to practice using coordinating conjunctions, semicolons, subordinating conjunctions, appositives, and conjunctive adverbs. Have your learners compare the two sentences together to see what meaning relationship they have together so they can determine which conjunction joins them together for the correct applicable meaning. The conjunctions "but" and "so" create very different meanings in sentences (so do "while" and "since" or "consequently" and "otherwise"), and this activity helps learners look more closely at how they're combining sentences together.
Essay / Speech	Literacy.W.1 Literacy.W.9 Literacy.SL.1 Literacy.SL.4 Literacy.SL.6	Students will choose from a few deep topics to either write an essay or turn their essay outline into a speech on the topic. During the speeches, students will need to understand and chart the speakers' thesis statements. And for you no-hassle grading rubrics are included to make your teaching life easier and save you time.
Story vs. Film Comparison	Literacy.RL.7	Students will compare the film to the memoir/play, analyzing the similarities and differences in various aspects of the two works of art.
Holocaust Reading List	Literacy.RL.8.10	The Diary of Anne Frank happens at such a difficult, complex time in history. Here is a comprehensive list of 50+ young adult stories (both fiction and non-fiction) that will help students broaden, enhance, enrich their Holocaust and World War II experience.
